Course Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes

During the course, the students will foster and develop rational thought processes as they pertain to the proficient and safe operation of environmental engineering processing units. Students will analyze data obtained from engineering unit operations and tell technical information they learned through the writing of reports and as well as clear oral presentations and communication during teamwork.

- Ability to apply engineering design to produce solutions that meet specified needs with consideration of public health, safety, and welfare, as well as global, cultural, social, environmental, and economic factors

This laboratory experience focuses on unit operations and processes commonly applied in environmental engineering and supports fundamental concepts developed in required courses for Environmental Engineering majors. Individual and group reports and oral presentations will serve as vehicles for the development of technical communications skills. 50 minutes lecture and two and a half hours of laboratory per week during 6 weeks.
